Dialog, then attribution *

"Jane, I don't love you anymore," said Tarzan. **

Dialog broken by attribution

"Tarzan," said Jane, "you always were more interested in your elephants than you were in me."

Attribution, then dialog

Tarzan said, "I find their conversation more stimulating than yours."

Dialog, attribution, then new sentence of dialog

"I'm going back to my father in Baltimore," said Jane. "I'm taking my leopard-skin outfit with me."

Dialog broken by attribution

"And I," said Tarzan, "am keeping the tree house. There are plenty of baboons that will be glad to share it with me."

Dialog ending with an exclamation point

"And to think that I almost gave up civilization for you, Monkey Boy!" said Jane.

Dialog ending with a quotation mark

"Monkey Boy?" asked Tarzan, a tear forming in the corner of his eye.
